Beneath the Spire...

SPEAKING THE LANGUAGE

When the Feast of Pentecost came...the Holy Spirit spread through their ranks, and they started speaking in a number of different languages as the Spirit gave them the ability.
Acts 2: 1, 4

There are many things I will miss about DC when she leaves us at the end of June. One is a skill of hers I didn't know about for a while – the ability to speak multiple languages with tremendous ease. And not just speak them – sing them!

I was first made aware of this hidden talent last summer, worshipping in the Fellowship Hall. Last hymn of this particular Sunday, #341, “Blessed Assurance, Jesus Is Mine.” I was singing along but something sounded strange, different. I looked around and my eyes fell on DC, just a few feet away from me, standing behind the makeshift lectern. As my eyes and ears honed in on her I quickly realized that she was not, in fact, singing English, but the alternate Korean text: “*Joo ahn eh ees suh jeul guh wuh rah.....*” Wow! I had no idea!

It was on that day I learned: whenever a Sunday morning hymn presented an alternative to English, you could count on DC engaging that foreign tongue with fervor and gusto. Spanish on “Lord, You Have Come To The Lakeshore.” Korean on “How Great Thou Art.” Even Choctow on “Amazing Grace” (when she wasn't singing Cherokee). I'd look over at her and she would just smile. Classic DC.

The real beauty of this, on my end at least, is that in some weird way, by hearing her singing all these different languages, I somehow started paying closer attention to what I was singing myself. Hymns I've voiced since my childhood, hundreds of times. Now the words were speaking anew to me: *This is my story, this is my song. Praising my savior all the day long. Now my boat's left on the shoreline behind me – now with you, I will seek other seas. Then sings my soul – how great thou art! I once was blind but now I see.....*

We celebrated Pentecost in May, but its impact continues far beyond an annual calendar date. And contrary to popular belief, it's not “speaking in tongues” that's going on here. These are actual languages the disciples are suddenly able to give voice to (a skill I would've killed for in my high school Latin final....) And why? If these disciples were going to tell the world about Jesus, they would need to be equipped with the most important skill of all: speaking the language.

Thing is, that can go far beyond the words that come out of one's mouth. I believe each of us has been given an ability to communicate the love of Christ to those who have yet to hear it, or hear it completely. Maybe it's

language. Or maybe it's a caring heart, or a sympathetic ear. Or maybe it's the ability to write, or the ability to serve food at Room in the Inn, or surprise a total stranger with an unsolicited smile. There are thousands of extrapolations of how to speak the language in a way that resonates with someone else – all it takes is us to go figure it out and then engage it fully.

Does that take us out of our comfort zone? I certainly hope so! Pentecost was not about people feeling comfortable, but people feeling inspired – literally, in-spired. Breathing the Spirit in so we can exhale things like grace, hope, love in our own language. A language that will most assuredly be heard by someone else in a way they had never heard it before.

That's one of the many lessons I'll take from DC. Well, that and the ability to sing Korean in a Presbyterian hymn. When we speak God's language, whatever that language is, we can always count on lives being refreshed and renewed – others as well as our own.

Stated Session Meeting on May 17, 2015:

IMPACT STORY - Anne Mar Kirby

Congregation members share an “Impact Story” during the worship service at least monthly. Please find below Anne Mar Kirby’s story shared February 15, 2015.

My husband, Sean and our two kids, Elaine and Hank, started coming to Trinity in January of 2013. We decided to join and become members a year later. Our time here has been short but we are truly happy to have found a place as special as Trinity. I was asked to share my impact story and the fact that I am speaking in front of you today is indeed a tribute to the impact Trinity has had on me and my family. Public speaking is not something I normally volunteer to do, but I did want to share with you what we love about Trinity.

During our first visit to Trinity, we happened to sit behind the Tappys and they greeted us immediately after the service. They extended a very warm welcome as several others did over the next few weeks. Over the course of the spring, there was a span of a few weeks when we were not able to make it to church. And when we did make it back; Mr. Tappy greeted us by name and said he was glad to see us after missing us for a few weeks. I was very impressed and touched that in a big church in the middle of Charlotte, someone would notice we weren’t here. And it was an experience we had not had at any other church we had visited. At that point, Sean and I knew we had found a church that could be for us.

Another indication that we had found a special place was when we received our invitation to attend the Montreat Retreat. Last summer, Sean and I were considering attending Montreat. We were on the fence about whether it was the right time to go, with our kids at young ages and if it would be something we would get much out of. I asked around to a few people and one day I got a full, one page letter from a member of the congregation, in great detail, explaining all the reasons the annual trip to Montreat was so special to her and her family. After reading that letter, I was again touched imagining the time she had spent, the thought she put in the letter, to try to nudge us into going. And not in a pushy way at all, but in a way that described what a great experience it was for her and she wanted us to share in that great experience too. I took that letter as a sign that we should go and I signed up that next day. Our entire family enjoyed every minute and we pledged that we will never miss a Montreat Retreat in the future.

The impact of Trinity on me and my family is how caring, thoughtful, kind and nurturing the congregation is to new and old members. We knew Trinity was our new church home because it was the caring people of Trinity that drew us in.

Summertime. Long walks on the beach, hikes up a mountain side to see a beautiful vista, a trip overseas for a really new experience, or perhaps just an opportunity to rest, relax and re-create ourselves with a break from our usual work and responsibilities. Fortunately, the church does not take a vacation. Its work and mission go on throughout the year. Its financial responsibilities continue even if its members miss a Sunday now and then. Let us all remember to keep current with our pledges and gifts to the church throughout the summer.

Capital Campaign Committee Update

This report was made after the worship service on May 31, 2015 by Walt Reid.

Good morning.

I am excited and thankful to be here today to give an update on where we are with the capital campaign construction activities. The theme for today is “celebration”...we want to take time and reflect on what we have accomplished together and talk about where we are going next.

As Dr. Cockrill expressed to us in August 2013, our capital improvement projects were prioritized into phases, based on committee input and Session approval. Phase 1 includes repair and renovate the air conditioning and paint the front entry columns, sanctuary and steeple. Phase 2 is to paint the rest of the buildings; add technology and building security, and perform interior renovations. Phase 3 is about reconfiguring our parking and entranceway.

So let's celebrate!

We celebrate...the cool air in the sanctuary! Last year at this time, we were just kicking off the renovation of the air conditioning.

We celebrate...that our weekday school students and church staff are safer because we have controlled access to our buildings.

We celebrate our contribution to making the world a greener place... our energy costs are down by almost 40% over this time last year.

We celebrate...that some projects are under budget but some are over budget but with the guidance of the Session and the congregation's support to “do it right”...we have found a way to keep moving forward.

We celebrate...that we have honored our commitment to repay the endowment.

We celebrate...the columns that have been repaired and repainted...well, almost.

And lastly, we celebrate...that our campus is more inviting to our neighbors...fresh paint does wonders!

This opportunity to celebrate would not have been possible without your support and for that we are thankful.

So now let's turn to what's next. As we started the work on Phase 2 and Phase 3 we reminded ourselves that we need to remain true to the input collected in the feasibility study, congregational comments, and capital campaign materials. We have expanded that thinking to include Trinity's original vision and history. At our meetings, the committee reiterates this “guiding principle”....which is to make Trinity a comfortable and appealing place to gather as well as worship. To that end, we have a couple of exciting announcements:

With the Session's approval, we have hired an architect. The architect has been charged with designing the renovations of the administration building but also to develop a campus master plan. The intent is to help us consider both current and future needs so we can be good stewards of our financial resources. The design and engineering work will take several months. We expect to be ready to brief the Session in early fall.

The second important announcement is related to the columbarium project. Several members have expressed interest in a columbarium but frankly progress has been a challenge. So, in concert with the Session and Buildings and Grounds Ministry Team, we will incorporate the design and planning of the columbarium into our go-forward planning.


We are excited about what has been accomplished but what the committee calls the “big stuff” is coming up and we need your support more than ever. I remain energized and excited to see what this


