Session Highlights

Stated Session Meeting on March 15, 2015:

A motion from the Capital Campaign Construction Committee was approved to accept an \$81,000 proposal to paint the exterior of the church. The final proposal number may be below this amount, but will not exceed \$81,000. The committee had three quotes and the other two were \$90,000 and \$102,000. Additionally, the committee requested approval to accept Marty Quinn's proposal to paint the front of the church (\$5,760), which does not include the steeple and the columns. This is not part of the proposal to paint the church's exterior. Marty is painting the steeple and columns and this work coincides with what he is doing.

The Personnel Ministry Team presented a three month extension contract for the Reverend DC Horne from May 1 through July 31, 2015 which was approved.

A motion from the Worship Ministry Team was approved for Rhonda McClain to administer communion at the Easter Sunday worship service on April 5, 2015.

A motion from the Finance Ministry Team was approved to accept Louise Sanford's resignation as treasurer with gratitude and to elect Cookie Parnell as her replacement.

IMPACT STORY - Fran Worthington

Congregation members share an "Impact Story" during the worship service at least monthly. Please find below Fran Worthington's story shared December 21, 2014.

Good morning! I am Fran Worthington and I love and treasure Trinity Presbyterian Church.

Growing up in Fayetteville, North Carolina, my parents and I attended Hay Street Methodist Church and later were charter members of the newly-formed Haymount Methodist Church. As did many of the single women of Fayetteville, I met and married a career Army officer who urged me to convert to his Roman Catholic religion. During the next 23 years, we became the proud parents of four children and moved our household 20 times, from Japan to Germany and points in between and finally settled in Charlotte. When that marriage ended in divorce and I was excommunicated from the Catholic Church, a friend invited me to visit Trinity. The first time I walked through the Narthex into this beautiful Sanctuary, I was enveloped in a feeling of peace, serenity and the presence of a loving God; and I became a Trinity member 30 years ago on September 16, 1984.

With a nod to a certain late-night TV host, I would like to share with you my top ten reasons for loving and treasuring this incredible church.

10. This campus with its beautiful trees, soaring steeple and welcoming buildings.

9. The many programs and groups with which members can become involved and participate.

In-Home Communion Set

In September, 2013, Ben Owen III, Seagrove, North Carolina, was commissioned to craft a small In-Home communion set for Trinity Presbyterian Church. This communion set will be a gift to the church by Debbie Thompson in memory of her father, Willie Edward Royal. For those who knew Willie, he was an avid collector of Ben Owen Pottery and would feel blessed to know that those unable to receive communion at church would now be able to receive it in a beautiful communion set at home. The In-Home communion set is done in Ben's newest color, plum. The plum glaze is a variation of the cabernet or copper red finish. Ben also crafted the communion set that Trinity uses at Montreat.

In looking at this beautiful communion set and trying to determine how it could be safely stored for travel, Dale Sarjeant, an avid woodworker, volunteered to make a case to house it. Dale designed a beautiful carrying case. The

case is made out of red oak for the frame and base. The sides and top are made from bleached or blonde mahogany. The mahogany that was used came from the restoration that Dale and Janet did of the 1956 home of William and Jeanne Dixon, former Trinity Presbyterian Church members. Dale and Janet purchased the Dixon home in 2003. The existing den walls were covered in blonde mahogany. Much of this wood was salvaged and used in new restoration or stored for future woodworking projects like this. This heritage makes this communion case even more special.

The communion set will be on display in the case in the Parlor and you may see the carrying case in DC's office.

Because the shipping fees are based on size these buses are loaded with food, medicine and clothing for the very needy in Bayonnaise, Trinity hosted the bus as it was a Haiti. convenient location for church members from Trinity, First Presbyterian, Sardis Presbyterian and Myers Park Methodist to bring donations while the bus was in our parking lot over Easter weekend. Due to these donations, and many others, the bus will be totally full with over 1,000 pounds of beans, 4,000 pounds of rice, many bags of clothes and medicine. In addition, Samaritans Feet donated 1.000 pairs of shoes which are sorely needed. The contents of the bus will be received joyfully and gratefully by our Haitian brothers and sisters. The Fellowship of Room in the Inn

Once again, Trinity opened its doors and provided shelter for some of Charlotte's homeless men, women, and children during the winter months. That's 144 beds provided for folks in need and a lot of food and fellowship.

The Room in the Inn (RITI) program was started by Urban Ministry Center in 1996 with two goals in mind. First, to provide a warm, safe, and dry place for Mecklenburg's homeless population during our coldest months. Approximately 130 area churches and colleges participate in the RITI program by taking in twelve to fourteen homeless guests on their assigned evening. The second goal of the RITI program is to provide a personal relationship with homeless people and a deeper understanding of the issue of homelessness.

What I enjoy most about RITI is the ability to sit down and have dinner with our homeless guests. These are folks that most of us wouldn't ordinarily have an opportunity to have a conversation with and for many people the thought of talking to a homeless person makes them uncomfortable.

If you have never come for a RITI dinner, I encourage you to try it out next year. There is something innately comforting about sitting around a table to eat a good meal and share conversation with others. I have had talks about the weather, sports, movies, kids, schools, jobs, travel, and sometimes even religion and politics. While I recognize that I am only getting a snippet of information from my fellow dinner companions, collectively, I feel that I have gained a much broader understanding of the issues facing our homeless population, as well as a realization that we all have a lot more in common than we think.

Liz Clasen-Kelly, Associate Executive Director of Urban Ministry Center, recently told me about a formerly homeless man who was a guest of the RITI program last year and came back to Urban Ministry at the beginning of this year's RITI season to ask if he could still spend the night with some of the churches. He was



told that he no longer qualified for a bed since he was no longer homeless. They asked him why he wanted to come back and he told them how much the social interactions at the churches he visited had meant to him. Living on the streets or in extreme poverty is very isolating. Each night as a guest of RITI, he was greeted with compassion and someone willing to listen.

At Trinity, we provided listening ears for all ages this season. I often noticed a Trinity volunteer lingering at the dinner table and talking with a guest long after the plates were cleared. We had an increase in the number of children we hosted this year and even our youngest guests were able to play games with some of Trinity's youngest volunteers.

I am going to leave you with pictures of some of the many volunteers that make RITI possible. I encourage you to ask them or any one of the other RITI volunteers to tell you about some of the folks they got to know this RITI season. Thank you to all of the volunteers who make Trinity a warm and inviting place for our guests to rest for the night!









Our Ongoing Summer Work With Freedom School Partners

Proud winner of the 2013 New York Life Excellence in Summer Learning Award through the National Summer Learning Association

For the third year in a row we have been gifted with a very special mission and outreach opportunity. It is uniquely special because it is fully funded and partially staffed. Trinity has the missing piece of the puzzle to make a huge difference in the lives of many Charlotte children. What is it, and what is the role we are to play?

We will again be partnering with Church at Charlotte (June 18 through July 29 - scholars on site). Trinity will provide the physical space and volunteers for one of Charlotte's nineteen (19) Freedom Schools.

Freedom School Partners have been operating in their present form with their current name in the Charlotte area since 2004. Their mission is to engage, educate, and empower children K-8th grade to succeed in school and in life through quality year-round academic enrichment programs. Children at a summer Freedom School are referred to as scholars. The program is literacy based. The participants are expected and required to read daily. Parent involvement is welcomed as the spaces for each school are limited. Not everyone who applies will be selected. Our scholars will come from Sharon Elementary and the Gladedale Community, which is at the intersection of Olde Providence Road and Providence Road.
