PRACTICING GRATITUDE

A few weeks ago, Grace and I were strolling the campus, having what I like to call a "moving meeting." If the weather's right, it's a lot better than sitting cooped up in the office! Anyway, we wound around the back corner to the Weekday School entrance and saw some school kids on the playground with their teachers, so we went over to say hi.

As we got closer, we noticed an older lady outside the playground fence with a dog. The kids were waving and smiling at the dog as she bounced up and down in excitement. Grace and I began a conversation with this woman. Turns out she has lived in the neighborhood for two decades. When she learned we were the pastors, she excitedly began telling us about her enthusiasm for Trinity, how she's noticed a new energy and vitality in recent years, how wonderfully friendly its people are. Grace and I were quite impressed that she shared this.

But not as impressed as what she shared next.

I can't remember exactly how she got on the subject, but at some point she told us that she had included Trinity in her will. This woman who had no affiliation with our church, other than the fact that she lived in the same neighborhood. "I've walked these grounds for years and years," she told us. "I've talked to your people. These are gifts you've given me, whether you realize it or not. I just want to give something back. I want to be part of Trinity's mission for the future."

Grace and I talked with this woman for a while longer, and then she and her dog headed home. But what she told us would not leave my mind – that a Trinity neighbor would include us in her will, for no other reason than simple gratitude.

Merriam-Webster defines gratitude as: *the quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreciation for and to return kindness.* It is the opposite of obligation, where we're coerced to respond. Gratitude is an act from somewhere deep within us; from the heart. And because of that, it makes us feel good. That's not why we do it, but it's a pleasant side effect.

What things in your life inspire you to respond with gratitude? And in what ways? How have you shared your gratitude with family, with friends, with your church, with other things in your life that bear special meaning for you?

We are, of course, right in the thick of our Stewardship season – a perfect time to reflect on our gratitude for our great church and how we might respond come October 25. But beyond that, I want to invite you to carve out time in your busy lives to experience gratitude. Reach out to at least two people this week and share words of affection and graciousness. Tell someone how special they are to you. Don't wait for a reason – let the Spirit move you.

My hunch? Like that neighbor Grace and I ran into at the playground, gratitude becomes contagious!

The plan is to proceed through the rest of this year with Grace and myself working with the Congregational Care Ministry Team to tend to the care needs of our church. Update from the Director of Music Search Committee

Trinity's Director of Music Search Committee was formed this past March and we have been meeting regularly since then. You may recall one of our first tasks was creating a congregational survey in April to assess our current music ministry and get your feedback and suggestions. In May and June, we researched job descriptions from other churches, and talked with those who had recently conducted a Director of Music search. In July, we posted the position on our own website, Charlotte Presbytery's website, and the websites of the American Guild of Organists, the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, and the American Choral Directors Association.

Our committee feels we conducted a very thorough search that allowed us to learn about the music ministries of other churches and the range of talent looking to fill Director of Music positions. Over the thirty days the listing was posted, we received twenty-seven applications and fielded another half-dozen phone calls. We had applicants from Rhode Island to Arkansas, and even one from Rome - Rome, Italy! (not Georgia). We ultimately selected four highly qualified applicants to interview and gave each one thoughtful and prayerful consideration.

Throughout the past seven months, we also began to realize just how fortunate Trinity has been to have Chris Gilliam as our Interim Director of Music and Michael Rowland as our Interim oOrganist. This dynamic duo has not only led us through a smooth transition, they have enriched our worship service with quality music and new ideas, not to mention their rapport and congeniality with church staff and choir members alike. Both have qualifications and experience second to none of all twenty-seven candidates we reviewed.

So we are thrilled to announce that the Session has approved our first choice and recommendation to hire Chris Gilliam as Trinity's permanent Director of Music and Michael Rowland as Trinity's permanent organist. We hope you are as pleased and excited about our decision as we are! We also hope you will join us at a reception in the Parlor after church on Sunday, November 1 to celebrate with Chris and Michael and welcome them - this time, permanently - to Trinity!

All Saints' Day

Celebrating the Communion of Saints

On Sunday, November 1, we will celebrate All Saints' Day. As is the custom in our congregation, we will lift in prayer the names of those members who have died since the last All Saints' Day, as well as the names of others dear to our members who have died. A letter will convey an invitation to families of members whose names will be read aloud to be present for the service.

This day of giving thanks for those who have lived and died in the faith is a modern-day celebration of a festival that originated in the 8th century. In its origin, the festival included 2 days: November 1 was a time of celebration of the known "heroes" of the faith (martyrs and those canonized as saints by the medieval church); November 2, called "All Souls' Day," was a day to commemorate all others, known and unknown, who have kept the faith in their time and place. Because in the Reformed tradition all those who live by faith are designated as saints, there is only one day of celebration. It is called All Saints' Day and occurs yearly on November 1.

In England, All Saints' Day was also known as All Hallows' Day (from the Old English word for saint: *haelou*). Preparations for the celebration to honor the deceased were made on the evening before (All Hallows' Eve). A secularized version of that evening of preparation is the basis for modern observances of Halloween.

In our congregation, All Saints' Day is remembered with the celebration of the Lord's Supper.

TRINITY GOES GREEN BECAUSE IT MATTERS

The Earth is the Lord's, and all that is in it. . . . Psalm 24:1



We all know the environmental challenges our world is facing these days:

- One-fifth of our tropical rainforests crucial to the overall world climate have been cleared since 1960 and are disappearing at 1% each year.
- We're currently operating at 100 to 1000 times the normal extinction rate which means that today, one in four mammal species, one in ten bird species, one in four amphibian species, and half of all primate species are threatened with extinction.
- Fisheries in our lakes, rivers and oceans are being depleted at twice their replacement rate.
- And speaking of water, by 2020 one in three people will suffer from fresh water shortages. In third-world countries this has already reached epidemic proportions.

I imagine we've all heard statistics like these before. Now, here's the interesting thing: these were not compiled by some scientist or environmental activist. These statistics came from Christian writer Brian McLaren in his book *Everything Must Change*. Brian is part of a new movement – or more appropriately a new-old movement – to reclaim, among other things, the environmental mission of the Christian faith. He is making the case that "going green," as the current lingo goes, is not simply a nice thing for people of faith to do, but a Biblical mandate and duty for every follower of Christ.

So I want you to know some changes that we at Trinity are making this fall to do our part as a faithful congregation of followers to "go green:"

- We are phasing out our Styrofoam cups/plates/bowls and plastic cutlery, switching to compostable options such as paper coffee cups with sleeves, heavy fibered plates and bowls, and corn-based plastic cups and cutlery.
- We have added recycling bins throughout the church facility primarily in the Fellowship Hall, the kitchen, and next to our two drink vending machines. Thanks in advance for putting all recyclables in there instead of using trash cans.
- We are switching to a fair-trade, shade-grown coffee for general church use. It also tastes better and actually costs less than what we were using before.

Is there more we can do? You bet! If you have ideas, please share them with Grace or Steve. Going forward, we want to be good stewards of both God's creation and our financial resources. Thank you for doing your part – here at Trinity, at home and in the workplace – for caring for God's wonderful creation!

You might have seen some of our many efforts to date, including:

The new church website, trinitypreschurch.org. This website contains great information about Trinity, including the details of upcoming events, lots of great pictures of our congregation and missions, information about the Weekday School, a fully-secured giving page, and a member log-in section where members can access an up-to-date church directory. The website also contains the latest sermons for listening at home or on-thego. Each month, the site receives thousands of views, and the majority of views come from first-time visitors to the site!

The new Constant Contact weekly email from Becky. Constant Contact, which is part of Trinity's 2015 Vision, offers church staff a more efficient way to create and send e-mails to the congregation, and it also offers non-members an easy way to subscribe to church updates. We've heard great feedback about the look of these new emails, and our team is extremely appreciative of Becky's help in getting this launched.

Trinity's Facebook account. This is another great way to share news about Trinity, and it's full of great photos from recent church events. Facebook also offers a great way to promote upcoming events. For example, more than ten thousand people saw the news about the September food truck event!

Trinity's Twitter account. It's not possible to tell Trinity's story in just 140 characters, but we try. Posting photos to Twitter helps, and we're also using hashtags for people to find us a little more easily. If you are on Twitter, look for #TPCintheQC and #SeeTrinityPres. Feel free to use these in your tweets, too!

The new Publicity Request Form and Publicity Guidelines. Of course, it is hard for our team to get the word out about events if we don't know about them, and this is where all of you can help! Be sure to look for the new Publicity Request Form and the new Publicity Guidelines that will be available in the church office. If you are planning an upcoming event and would like to publicize it through one or more of the various options available, the form and guidelines will help ensure that we get the right information to use.

FREEDOM SCHOOL PARTNERS

This summer Trinity Presbyterian Church hosted another successful Freedom School Partner program. The Freedom School Partners program is a six week summer educational and enrichment program for children in Kindergarten through 8th grade which gives children the opportunity to develop and increase their literary skills, their social and emotional development, as well as their intellectual and listening skills within a learning environment which encourages and inspires them to believe in themselves in order to help them attain and set higher educational goals. The program also provides a framework and opportunity for children to increase their individual character development and leadership skills.

Daily educational and enrichment programs at nineteen sites in Charlotte included: pep rallies; guest speakers; reading sessions; field trips to various cultural, educational, museums, parks, and other community sites; sporting events; field days; picnics; and a final jubilee celebration day.

Trinity Presbyterian supports the program primarily through the use of our large facilities – buildings and land. We also support the overall program with supplies. According to Kenya Smith, a Freedom School Partners Coordinator, Trinity Presbyterian Church members who contributed their time and talents in various capacities for this year's program included Rev. DC Horne, Carolyn Voorheis, Sarah Henry and Fran Worthington. We want to thank them and the church staff who had to deal with the day to day support. This is a key program that we want to support, and we will look to grow the church volunteer effort in future years.

As we have read in recent news material, Charlotte trails all other fifty large US cities in upward mobility. By supporting this program we help instill in these children some measure of success for them to build on.

basic clothing such as socks, underwear, hats and gloves are given to approximately 100 men and women (our neighbors) each season.


