Room in the Inn

Several challenges arise in finding a safe, warm, and comfortable place to rest at night. The lack of affordable housing, the lure of addiction, crippling mental health, and broken public service systems all contribute to people experiencing homelessness in Charlotte. With the many obstacles of COVID, Trinity's leadership had to consider how we could provide a safe place for our neighbors to stay. In the interest of safety for our guests and our volunteers, the leadership for Room in the Inn and Mission & Outreach felt we could not safely socially distance our neighbors and hosts in the Fellowship Hall at



Trinity. After many conversations as a church, Trinity partnered with Sardis Presbyterian Church for the 2022 Room in the Inn season to help house eight guests once a week at Sardis. Sardis Presbyterian has a unique facility where guests can sleep in separate rooms and overnight hosts have a separate space in which to sleep. Trinity's RITI and M&O leadership agreed to provide and care for the Room in the Inn guests on Sunday nights for the month of

On the Journey



There is a story of a visiting pastor who attended a church breakfast in the middle of a rural farming area of the country. The group had asked an older farmer, decked out in bib overalls, to say grace for the morning breakfast. "Lord, I hate buttermilk," the farmer began. The visiting pastor wondered where this was going. The farmer continued, "Lord, I hate lard." Now the pastor was concerned. Without missing a beat, the farmer said, "And Lord, you know I

don't much care for raw white flour." The pastor glanced around the room and saw he wasn't the only one feeling uncomfortable. Then the farmer added, "But Lord, when you mix them all together and bake them, I do love warm fresh biscuits. A New Way to Meet - Hybrid Gatherings

Prior to the pandemic, most church meetings were done exclusively in-person, often creating challenges in finding a day and time that worked for everyone. One of the silver linings of Covid has been learning to hold virtual meetings, which has increased overall participation since it's not dependent on everyone being physically present together. Now, as we begin to emerge from the pandemic, we anticipate an increased desire for the best of both worlds with hybrid meetings - merging in-person and online audiences as seamlessly as possible. At the end of last year our church acquired equipment to help us do this



well. This setup, which is currently located in the Heritage Room, includes a large monitor hooked up to a mini-computer and Bluetooth speaker. Inperson participants can use the equipment to log on to the church's Zoom account and bring online participants "into the room." This equipment is on a mobile cart that can be relocated to the Parlor and Fellowship Hall as needed. It's an ideal setup for ministry team and committee meetings, book clubs, Bible studies, and staff meetings; and opens the opportunity for many members of your group to participate. A New, Fresh Look

If you are just beginning the process of returning to church, whether for Sunday School, in-person Worship or group meetings, please make an effort to stop by the Sanctuary Narthex. While the pandemic kept many of us away from Trinity's campus, a team of church members took the opportunity to complete a long-awaited project to update the Narthex. With the assistance of the Buildings and Grounds Ministry Team, a fresh coat of paint was placed on the walls and a beautiful antique sideboard was purchased for the newly designated seating area. The Worship Ministry Team generously acquired a new handmade ceramic communion set to display on the

communion table. The Welcome Ministry Team framed several new art pieces, including "The Invitation to the Lord's Table" prayer. Furthermore, the project was able to be completed with anonymous donations from several different church members, which included a pair of newly recovered Martha Washington chairs, freshly recovered pew cushions, and the purchase of two modernized sets of mirrors. While the update has made this space more functional and inviting to those who enter, it is still a space that encompasses the traditions of Trinity and its mission to be welcoming to all.

Church Organ Renovation Update

Our lovely 1965 Moller Pipe organ will be receiving its first comprehensive and total overhaul soon. The restoration will return the organ to its full functionality, a capability we have not experienced for well over a decade. Over the last several months the Organ Task Force, comprised of Eric Banks, Jim Glenn, Suzanne Reid, Eric McGovern, and Jerry Parnell met regularly and accepted bids for refurbishment from several companies throughout the country. It was unanimously agreed upon that the Lewtak Pipe Organ Builders Company, based in Mocksville, NC, be hired to complete this project. The Session has approved funding and the project is expected to take up to nine months to complete. The target date for completion is the beginning of Advent. The pipes and console will be removed over the next few months. The current electric organ located in the left transept area will be moved back up to the loft and used until the project is finished. Michael Rowland, our marvelous organist, has agreed to present a dedicatory organ recital for all to hear when the project is finished. Stay tuned for periodic updates and as the work continues.

Trinity's Weekday School News

Motion to Accept Gift: Following Stewardship Ministry Team review and recommendation, motion to accept a gift of \$50,000 from the Gilchrist family for the purpose of supporting the repair and replacement of the organ within Trinity Presbyterian Church's Sanctuary. Motion was passed.

January

Finance Ministry Team recommended and Session approved, in two consecutive votes at a stated and called meeting, to use up to \$275,000 of endowment funds for the renovation and repair of the Sanctuary organ.

Finance Ministry Team moves to engage the congregation in early 2022 to educate them on the organ renovation project and request gifts for the organ renovation project. Any gifts received for the organ renovation project will be used to offset use of endowment funds. Motion was passed.

The Finance Ministry Team moves to use \$4,769.15 from the Church Session Discretionary Fund to cover the 2021 year -end deficit. The motion was passed.

The Finance Ministry Team moves to use \$62,820.92 from the Weekday School Carry Forward Reserve Fund to cover the 2021 year-end deficit. The motion was passed.

The Finance Ministry Team moved that the Session adopt the 2022 budget. The motion was passed. A Congregational Meeting will be called to, in part, present the 2022 budget to the congregation.
