Session at Room in the Inn







On Sunday, March 19, Trinity's Session served as Room in the Inn hosts at Sardis Presbyterian Church's Sardis House. They volunteered to ensure our neighbors had a safe and comfortable evening - cooked dinner, served dinner, prepared bagged lunches, and stayed overnight. They enjoyed a wonderful meal with our neighbors, mutually using the time to get to know one another and be in community, no matter where one may be laying their head that night. Following their time at Room in the Inn, your Session met for their monthly meeting and had a vulnerable and honest conversation about homelessness in Charlotte. There were discussions of what to do next. Where will our neighbors stay after Room in the Inn is complete in March? The answer: on the streets. How can we do more? Can we both be feet on the ground, helping with the urgent needs now, and also go upstream to address why homelessness is growing in Charlotte? Even more so, why are more and more homeless children and families attending Room in the Inn than ever before? Your Session leaned into the discussion of the harsh realities the Charlotte homeless community faces daily. They hope you will pray about these questions and possible answers as well.

We considered why this might be – a lack of convenience, our comfort level, and an obvious insulation from the need.

The challenges of our journey were far different than the scenarios we considered. What if we missed the bus and had to wait another hour for the next? What if our bus wasn't running? What if the combination of schedules, connectors, and walk time to and from stops caused us to miss our child's school bus or be late for work? Being in relationship with our neighbors means meeting them where they are — and perhaps getting to where they're going the way they're getting there. We'll ride again soon. Join us!

Culture of a Weekday School

Following these in-house field trips, the teachers continue these themes in the classroom. Our young students are scholars of world culture. They are eager to retell the legend of Neon, the Chinese dragon, and his fear of the color red! Ask a Weekday School student what it's like to play a

didgeridoo! They learned about the different regions of Africa, its animals, and participated in a traditional dance.

The joy of witnessing children learn is contagious. The WDS prides itself in offering opportunities for young students to immerse themselves in rich learning experiences. We may not be able to take them to faraway lands, but we can bring the "world in our backyard" to Trinity Weekday School.

Session Highlights

January Session Meeting

- A motion from the Finance Ministry Team to approve the Weekday School Budget for 2023 was seconded and approved.
- A motion from the Finance Ministry Team to approve the Church Budget for 2023 was seconded and approved. For this part of the meeting, the Senior and Associate Pastors were asked to step out. Walter Reid, Chair of the Finance Ministry Team, moderated this portion of the meeting.
- A motion was presented for a Congregational Meeting on February 12 to present the 2023 Budget, present changes to both Senior and Associate Pastor Terms of Call, conduct a meeting of the Corporation, and provide an update from the Way Forward Task Force was moved, seconded, and approved.
- Without objection, a motion from the Buildings & Grounds Ministry Team to approve the design of the new fountain for the memorial garden was approved. Note: the design and work are being paid for through Memorial Funds in memory of Kathleen Schneider.

- Without objection, the motion from the Worship Ministry Team to approve the following dates for communion was approved: January 8, February 28, April 6, April 9 (Easter), May 28, August 6, October 1, October 15, October 29, November 26, and December 24 (Christmas Eve).
